California Style Jungle Primaries...

Trample Your Freedoms

- They contradict the freedom of association found in Political Parties.
- Independents are already free to join parties during the primary, why should they make decisions for party members?

Are More Chaotic

- Question 3 allows for potentially dozens of candidates in a single race.
- Completing a ballot is longer and more confusing.
- Tabulating votes is significantly delayed and mistakes are common.

Are Open to Manipulation

- Rival parties can sabotage which candidates are chosen.
- Party platforms become irrelevant.
- Voter confusion skyrockets.
